LETTER FOR NOVEMBER

Dear Friends

Well, here we are in November and finally our new incumbent, Revd. Amanda Spence is joining us this month – I promise! (9th November 2022 at 7pm in church). It seems like an age since Napo retired and the Ministry Team took control of the reins. However, by God's grace we are now at last preparing for a new chapter in our ministry to the people of Hayes. I am not going to pretend it has been an easy year and nearly 10 months, but we have been supported by so many people, and I hope I have still managed a smile.

Our local clergy, both retired and stipendiary, have been faithful in their regular presiding at our 8am services and some others. Revd Roger Bristow has been our appointed minister for our 10.30am Holy Communion services and, together with Becky, we have still been able to accept requests for baptisms, weddings, funerals and interments of ashes. Our next meeting will be on **15th November 11.00am at The New Inn** for coffee and then lunch for those who wish to stay on.


The last few weeks have been difficult for us all – the death of Queen Elizabeth felt personal to many of us and we rightfully took some time to mourn her loss and pay our respects. Mothers' Union also recognises the continued importance of the work it does worldwide, and the lives that it transforms on a daily basis. As we slowly begin to recover from the loss of Her Majesty, I'd like to shed light on some important developments currently underway at Mothers' Union.

Mothers' Union Annual Gathering, held in Belfast on 23rd and 24th of September, went well and provoked some important

conversations that will hopefully lead to some exciting changes. We are also thrilled to announce that we are partnering with Women's Aid in the 'Come together to end domestic abuse' campaign, that was officially launched on 11th October. The Annual Gathering followed a packed programme dominated by members' stories exploring the theme of Transformation – Now! The weekend closed with a sublime concert by the Clare Chorale

Next year's gathering will be in York if anyone would like to attend.

October 9th to 15th was Prison Week. Not only are Mothers' Union one of the sponsors of Prisons Week, our members consistently work in Prisons to support those incarcerated and their families to build and sustain better relationships. One of the programmes that MU want to highlight is called 'Being Dad', currently being run in a prison for young offenders in Lichfield diocese.



Mothers' Union has partnered Women's with Aid for up a campaign against domestic abuse. An estimated 1.6 million women experience domestic abuse every year. Though that's only the tip of the iceberg, as many women don't report abuse due to fear of being iudaed or not believed. It's shocking to hear that one in seven children and young people under the age of 18 will have lived with domestic

violence at some point in their childhood. Three women are killed each fortnight by a current or ex-partner highlighting that so much change is needed before women and children are safe. Mothers' Union and Women's Aid are working together so that no girl has to be a victim of domestic abuse.

Mothers' Union is the first national charity to partner with Women's Aid Federation of England in this new campaign demonstrating how we can make a difference on this important issue if we all come together. There is no magic wand, as domestic abuse affects people throughout society and at every stage of life, but by coming together Mothers' Union Members are committing to raise awareness, dispel myths and take action to End Domestic Abuse. This year, Women's Aid Federation of England launches the 'Come Together to End Domestic Abuse' campaign. Mothers' Union is committed to ending domestic violence and abuse, expressed through its year-round activities and campaigning as well as specific focuses (such as participating in the annual 16 Days campaign to end genderbased violence). By joining together with Women's Aid, Mothers' Union are able to raise even more awareness, dispel myths and create safe spaces. As members of Hayes Mothers' Union, we can remember the 'Come Together to End Domestic Abuse' campaign in our prayers.

Three members attended the Diocesan Autumn meeting and AGM. I will report on this meeting in the next issue.

HELP YOUR HEDGEHOGS THIS AUTUMN

With our warmer British autumns, hedgehogs now tend to begin hibernation later – in December or January. In the meantime, it is critical that they build up enough body weight to get them through those lean, bleak weeks of January to April... so now is the time to help them, by feeding them.

The hedgehog is carnivorous and, in the wild, lives on a diet of beetles, earthworms and other invertebrates. But in the winter, the bugs are dead or buried, and the worms deep underground. So – a hedgehog would appreciate your help! But don't put out milk and bread – both are actually bad for hedgehogs. Instead, they will thrive on tins of dogfood or non-fishy cat-food and water.

And while your spiney guests are noisily munching their dinner, you can prepare a bedroom, should they decide to move in. A nice deep compost heap will keep a hedgehog warm. It is also possible to buy hedgehog hibernation nests.

HAYES MEN'S FELLOWSHIP

Going into November we retain our sense of confidence and optimism for the future activities of HMF. The Annual Service in St. Mary's in October launched our new season with a good turn-out of 32 members present. This compares well with the average percentage attendance of members in the years before covid interrupted proceedings, given that our retained membership had fallen from 100 to 80 in round terms.

My declared theme in leading the service was based on the wellknown passage of contrasting life choices in Ecclesiastes, chapter 3 verses 1-8, which begins "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven". It is the new season for Hayes Men's Fellowship and our time to choose to thrive in unity and friendship.

The service seemed well-received, perhaps because it was very much a team effort in at least three ways:

1. Colin Vivian, our former Chairman, continuing his role as Pastoral Care Officer, spoke movingly of the members who had passed on since our previous such service (which, you may recall, was held a year ago as a "Celebration of Life" of the thirteen members who had passed during the two years of covid restrictions when services were restricted). Then as now we honoured their memories with a minute's standing silence.

One of the names mentioned was Kenneth Baker and it was an additional privilege, just as this report was being prepared, to join with other HMF members in a large congregation which filled Coney Hill Baptist Church to celebrate Ken's life, as a musician and skilled accompanist to Hayes Philharmonic Choir for fifty years alongside a career in engineering which encompassed major infrastructure works across the country and in London, including London Bridge Station developments and Underground renewals. It left me thinking what a fascinating choice he would have made for a President's Afternoon guest speaker in March!

2. The Bible reading was then delivered eloquently by our Deputy Chairman, David Rowedder.

3. The retiring collection amounted to £173.92. This amazing generosity from our assembled HMF members has been donated to the Hayes Community Foodbank to help it continue its vital work in support of the local community. This is in line with our policy to collect monetary donations rather than actual goods for the Foodbank at our monthly meetings during the year.

When we moved over to the OCS for an informal meeting to present our new programme and to encourage re-enrolment, our members present increased to 38: the total included two new members. This is an encouraging boost to our recruitment campaign which, at the time of writing, has already produced a running total of 41 paid-up members. More are expected and others are welcome. Our simple criteria is to welcome men of any faith or none who are retired or semi-retired yet looking for a regular social life now free of a working routine.

It is encouraging too that some of our newer members have volunteered to undertake specific roles in our activities. For example, Bill Hudson will be assisting Tony Archer, our Walks Organiser, to lead monthly walks. This month he has proposed a new route in the Swanley area, which Tony described as "delightful" when they conducted the usual practice walk together. Our walkers are looking forward to joining Bill later this month for his second walk. Hopefully this will be some recompense for the cancellation at very short notice of September's walk due to Tony's ill-health. No doubt his intended walk in the Westerham area will feature later on in the season.

This is always a quiet period for HMF reports with no planned outing, but it was quieter still this year with no walk either. Nevertheless, a full programme of activities (meetings, outings and walks) is in place for the new season proceeding according to plan. So watch out for reports next month about our outing to the New Forest and our first guest speaker of the season, as well as the Swanley walk. Full up-to-date details can be viewed on our website at <u>www.hayesmensfellowship.org</u> and these reports will continue month by month here in *Hayes Herald*. Why not join us rather than just read about what we get up to? Pop along to a meeting and give us a try – no obligation but you will get a warm welcome to go along with the tea and biscuits! HMF is what our members bring in their participation and help us all to thrive and enjoy life in each other's company.

THE SMALL BELL

I was in Bromley this week, trying to find a warm jumper and a comfortable pair of shoes. Having failed in my mission, as usual, I was walking along the wide paved area of the High Street towards The Mall when I heard a tinkling bell, rather like the sound of a small bell on a Christmas tree. I glanced around to see where it had come from and



I heard the voice of a man sitting opposite me in the doorway of an empty shop which had closed down. My immediate thought was that he was homeless and asking for money but I walked closer and saw him ring a small bell, just once, and then held out something to passers-by. Then I heard the name Jesus. I approached him and heard him say "Give Jesus your heart, and he'll bless you" while offering a small yellow leaflet. Most people just walked past but I decided to talk to him and said "I gave my heart to Jesus many years ago but thank you for your courage." He looked at me with loving eyes and said "Take the leaflet anyway and give it to someone else." He was sitting in an electric wheelchair and told me he was 84 years old and had been doing this for many years in spite of poor health. He was the founder of the 'Street Evangelists Association' which has many members. He used to worship at Westminster Chapel where Dr. Martyn Lloyd-Jones used to preach in the 60's and 70's. He was doing what the early disciples and St. Paul did, preaching everywhere to the people.

Not everyone can do it but we are all parts of the same body of Christ, and this has been his ministry. I wondered if he received abuse or physical threats for what he was saying and doing, especially in this now violent and extreme society where law and respect are often ignored. Then I thought of the tinkling bell and it reminded me of the bell sounding the presence of the Holy Spirit during communion in the Catholic church and it occurred to me that the bell was not only drawing people's attention but a call to the Holy Spirit to bless his work and protect him, just as he protected Paul in the early church.

I felt humbled and blessed to have spoken to him. I used to take part in street evangelism as a young Christian and felt a bit ashamed to be reluctant to take part now but God has given me different paths to tread as the years have unfolded. The next time I hear a tinkling bell I shall think of this dear man and look for God's Holy Spirit in that moment, remembering what he said: "Give Jesus your heart and he will bless you". You won't find a simpler gospel than that.

I have his leaflet if anyone wants to read it. It is entitled:

CHRIST Is the ANSWER To your EVERY NEED


CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF BROTHER ANDREW (1928-2022)

Brother Andrew, the founder of Open Doors, died on 27th September 2022, aged 94.

Famous around the world as 'God's smuggler', he began his ministry in 1957 by smuggling Bibles across the Iron Curtain in a blue Volkswagen Beetle. That trip was the beginning of Open Doors which, more than 65 years later, is now supporting persecuted Christians around the world.

The remarkable story of his Bible 'smuggling' was told in his bestselling autobiography *God's Smuggler*.

After the fall of the Iron Curtain, Brother Andrew turned his attention to the Islamic World, saying that the rapid



spread of Islam posed the greatest challenge yet to the Christian church worldwide. He travelled to the Middle East and South Asia and had private meetings with leaders of several Islamic fundamentalist groups. However, Brother Andrew preached against retaliation – repeatedly declaring 'I sincerely love all Muslims' as a counter to the rising Islamophobia in the west.

Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands knighted Brother Andrew in 1993. In 1997, he received the World Evangelical Alliance's Religious Liberty Award, recognising his lifetime of service to suffering Christians.

But Open Doors UK reveals that "perhaps the recognition that pleased him most was the copies of KGB reports, which he obtained after the fall of the Iron Curtain. There were more than 150 pages about him, detailing his work in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Despite this, they were still unable to stop his work."
